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Updates on Most Recent Local Activity: Week 15 (Apr 10 – Apr 16)

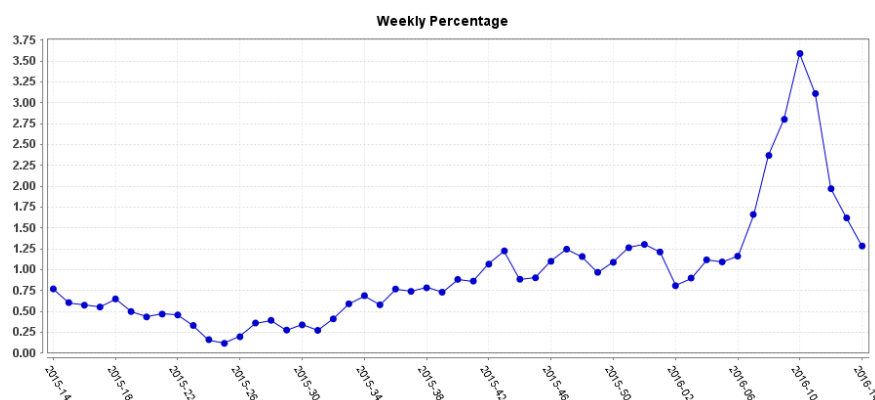
- The number of visits for ILI continues to decline. The percent and count of ILI visits for the most current week (Week 15) are 1.21% and 106, respectively.
- Eighteen influenza-related deaths have been reported in Marion County this flu season.
- The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recently reported preliminary overall influenza vaccine effectiveness (VE) of 59% this season.¹ Even though the vaccine is not 100% effective, those who are vaccinated will often have milder symptoms and fewer hospitalizations.²

Local (Week 14)

- The percent and count of ED visits with a chief complaint of ILI was 1.28 and 143 of all ED visits, respectively.
- Children under the age of 5 have the highest age-specific percent ILI (3.2%).

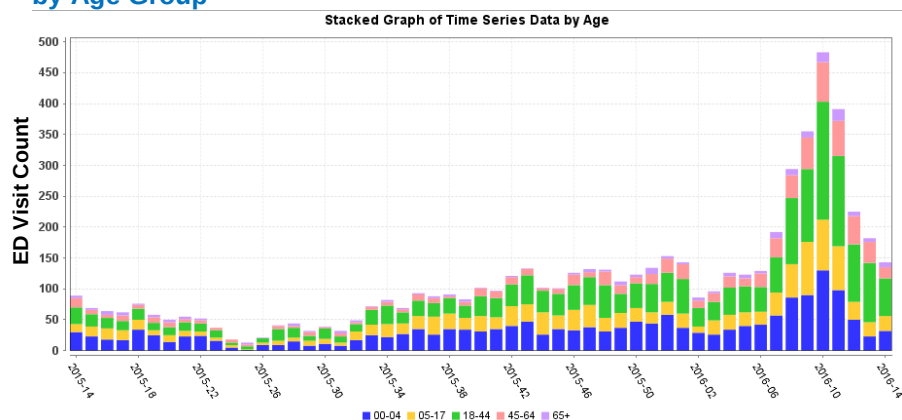

Figure 1 represents the percent of all ED visits that were categorized as ILI. The overall percent ILI for Week 14 is 1.3% (lower than last week).

ILI visit means that the patient reported fever with cough or sore throat, or used the word "flu" to describe either their symptoms or their reason for the ED visit.

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Indiana (Week 14)

As of 2 p.m. on April 15, 2016, ISDH has not released the flu report for Week 14. For informational purposes and your convenience, the information below is from the flu report for the previous week (Week 13).

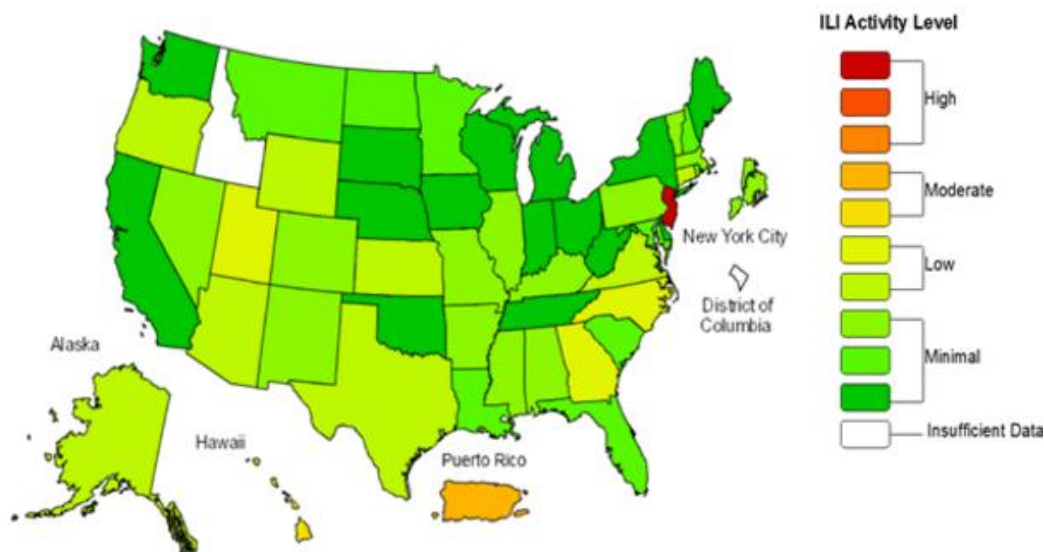

- Indiana is experiencing minimal and low influenza activity. For Week 13, ISDH reports 1.8% ILI at sentinel provider sites and 1.58% ILI ED visits. This is a decrease in sentinel surveillance and a decrease in ED surveillance compared to last week.
- Eight (8) deaths have been reported in Indiana for Week 13. The total number of mortalities in Indiana this flu season is 53.
- For Week 13 and among samples tested at the state lab: 5 specimens tested positive for 2009 A/H1N1pdm virus; 0 specimens tested positive for Influenza A/H3 seasonal virus; 0 specimens tested positive for Influenza A/H1 seasonal virus; 2 specimens tested positive for Influenza B seasonal virus; and there was 1 inconclusive sample.

Influenza-Like Illness (ILI) Activity Level Indicator Determined by Data Reported to ILINet
2015-16 Influenza Season Week 14 ending Apr 09, 2016



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- During Week 14, the majority of states are reporting minimal and low influenza activity. In addition, during Week 14, 2.1% of outpatient visits reported through the U.S. Outpatient Influenza-like Illness Surveillance Network (ILINet) were due to ILI. This is a decrease from previous week (Week 13=2.4%) and is at the national baseline (2.1%).
- Ten influenza-related pediatric deaths were reported for Week 14. The season mortality is at 50.
- The most frequently identified influenza virus type reported by public health laboratories during Week 14 was influenza A, with influenza A (H1N1) viruses predominating.
