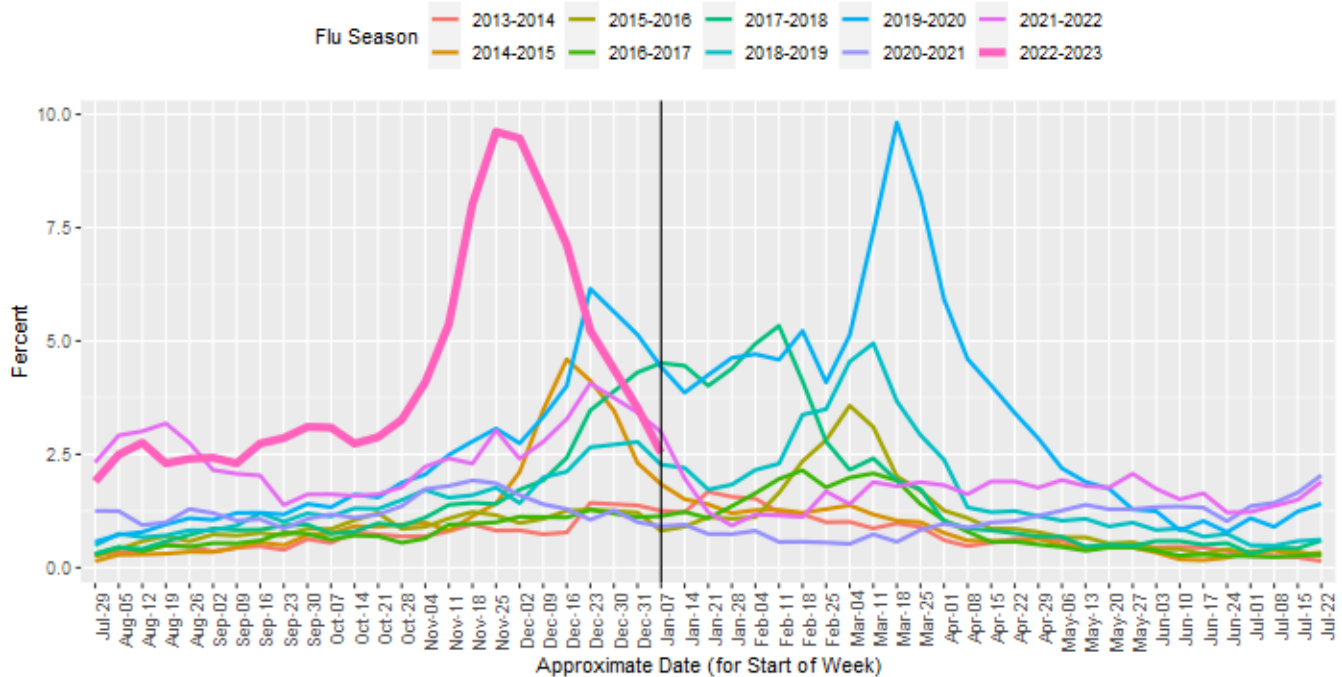

Influenza-like Illness ED visits in Marion County continued to decrease during the last week.

- During week 02 (January 08 to January 14), **2.54% of Marion County ED visits had ILI symptoms**. This rate was lower than last week (3.54%). The median percent of ILI-related ED visits for week 02 in the last five years (2019-2023) was 2.54%.
- In Marion County hospitals, 0-4 years old had the highest rate (6.32%) of ILI related ED Visits. This rate is lower than the last week (9.55%). The median percent of 0-4 years old ILI-related ED visits for week 02 over the last five years was 6.62%.
- ED visits for Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) and other respiratory illnesses for 0-4 years old continued to decrease** during the last week.
 - RSV is a common respiratory virus that is the most common cause of bronchiolitis and pneumonia for children under 1 year of age in the U.S

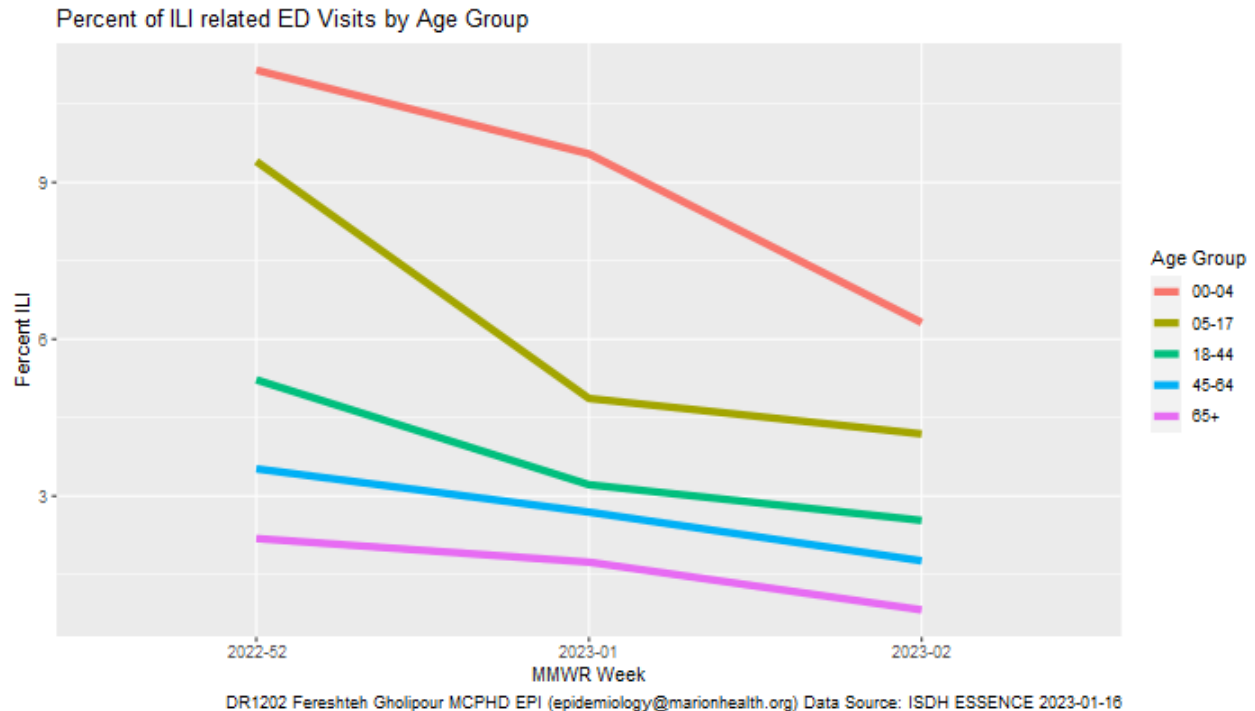

Marion County (Week 01, January 01, 2023- January 07, 2023)

- The percentage of ILI-related ED visits was 3.54% out of all ED visits.
- In Marion County hospitals, 0-4 years old had the highest rate (9.55%) of ILI related ED Visits.

Indiana (Week 01, January 01, 2023- January 07, 2023)

- Indiana is experiencing **Moderate** ILI activity. For week 01, IDOH reported 2.88% ILI at sentinel provider sites and 2.92% ILI at ED and urgent care visits. Both rates decreased during the last week.
- There have been **one hundred thirty-two influenza-associated deaths** this season, **eighteen** of those Influenza-associated deaths were detected for the week 01.
- Seven specimens were tested at the IDOH Laboratory during Week 01. One was detected as Influenza A/ H1N1 and six were detected as Influenza negative.

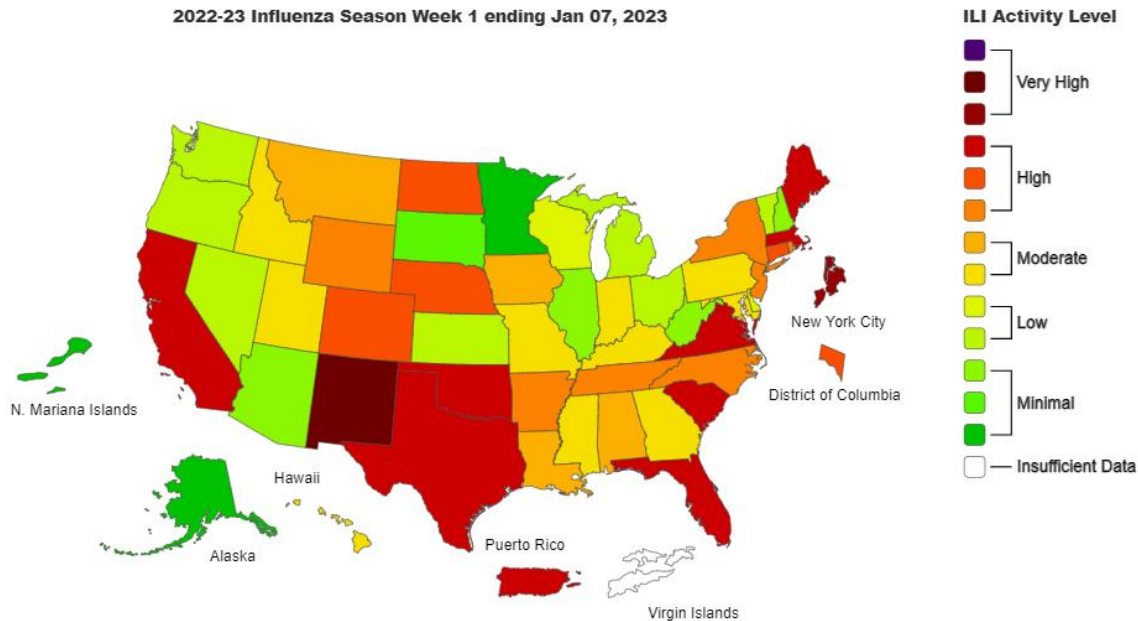

- Seasonal Influenza activity is declining across the US.
- Of outpatient visits to a healthcare provider, **4% were ILI-related**, as reported through the U.S. Outpatient Influenza-like Illness Surveillance Network (ILINet). This rate is lower than the last week (4.1%) but higher than the national baseline of 2.5%.
- **Five influenza-associated pediatric deaths were reported to CDC** during the week 01. All five deaths were associated with influenza A viruses. Seventy-nine influenza-associated pediatric deaths occurring during the 2022-2023 season have been reported to CDC.
- During Week 01, **8.6% of clinical laboratory specimens were positive for influenza**. This rate is lower than last week (15%).
- During Week 01, **743 (11%) specimens were positive at public health laboratories**. This rate is lower than last week (11.3%).
