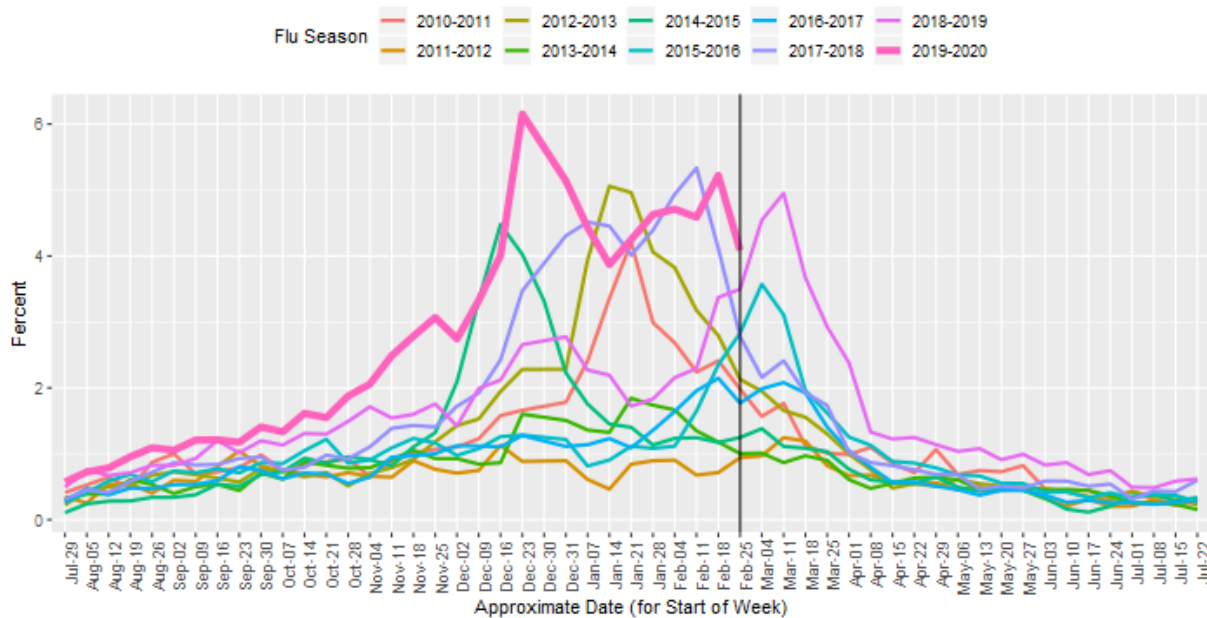
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### Updates on Most Recent Local Activity: Week 09 (February 23 – February 29)

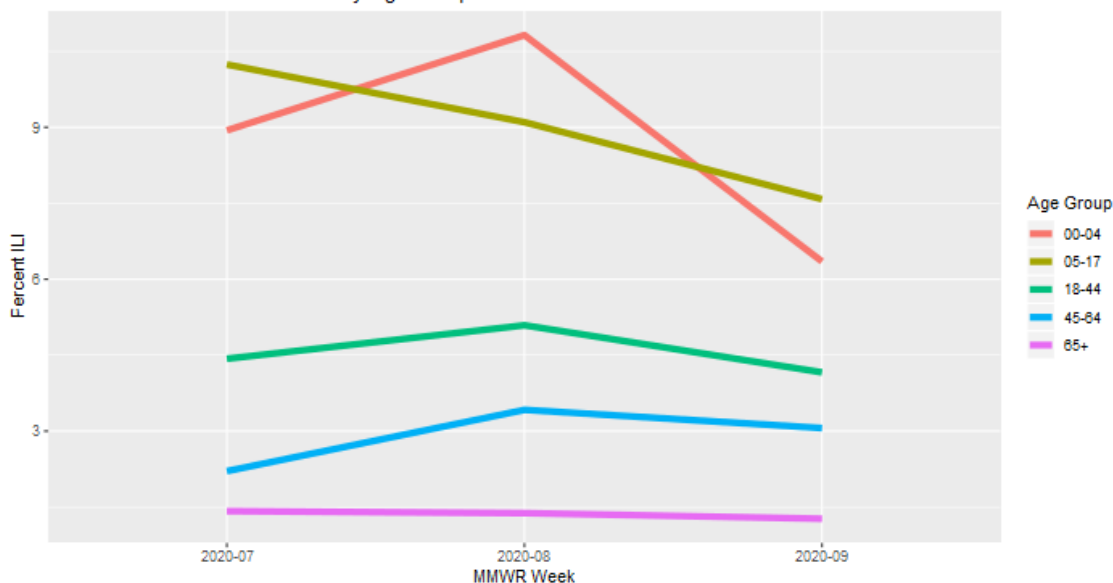
- During Week 09, **4.09% of Marion County ED visits had ILI symptoms.**
- There have been **fourteen influenza-associated deaths for Marion County residents** this flu season.
- In Marion County hospitals' ED population, ILI was **most common in the 5-17 age group.** Among ED visits by 5-17 year olds, 7.58% was for ILI. ILI among ED visits by 0-4 year olds was next highest, at 6.35%.

**Note:** ILI (Influenza-Like Illness) visit means that the patient reported fever with cough or sore throat, or used the word "flu" or "influenza" to describe either their symptoms or their reason for the ED (Emergency Department) visit.

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#### Local (Week 08)

- The percentage of ILI related ED visits was 5.22%.
- Children age 0-4 had the highest age-specific percent ILI (10.82%).

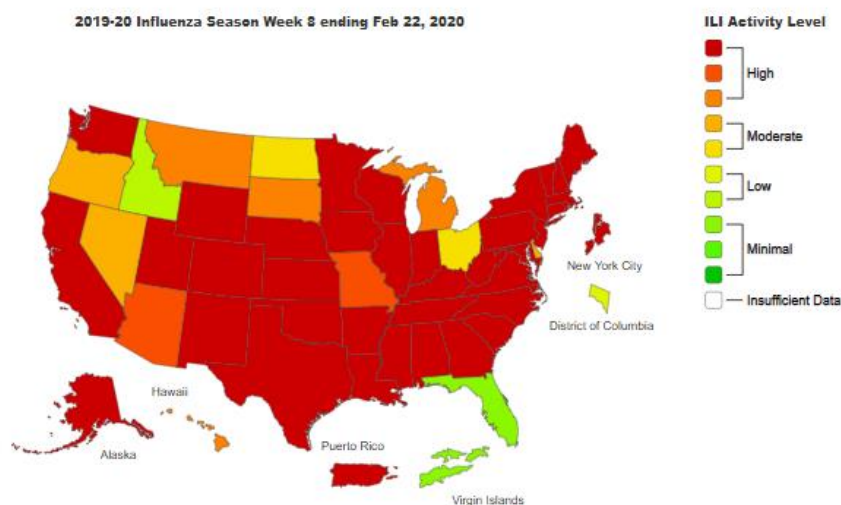
#### Indiana (Week 08)

- Indiana is experiencing **widespread and high ILI activity**. For Week 08, ISDH reported 5.76% ILI at sentinel provider sites and 4.97% ILI ED and urgent care visits. This was **a decrease for sentinel provider sites** (6.13% Week 07) and **ED and urgent care visits** (5.15% Week 07).
- There have been **69 influenza-associated deaths** this season
- **The percent positivity of influenza specimens tested in ISDH Laboratories increased** (Week 08: 85.3% vs Week 07: 71.7%). Of the 29 positive influenza specimens submitted: 17 influenza 2009 A/H1N1pdm virus, 11 influenza B Victoria seasonal virus, and 1 influenza B virus, genotype pending.

- **Influenza activity remained high, but decreased for the second week in a row in reporting jurisdictions.** The majority of jurisdictions had high and widespread influenza activity.
- **Outpatient visits due to ILI was at 5.5%**, as reported through the U.S. Outpatient Influenza-like Illness Surveillance Network (ILINet). This was **lower than Week 07 (6.1%)**.
- **One hundred and twenty-five influenza-associated pediatric deaths** have been reported to CDC this flu season.
- During Week 08, **positive influenza tests were slightly lower in clinical laboratories** compared to Week 07 (26.4% vs 29.6% respectively). **Influenza A had more positive respiratory specimens than influenza B** (67.9% vs. 32.1% respectively).
- During Week 08, **1,153 (64.7%) of specimens were positive at public health laboratories**. Of the 1,153 positive specimens, the top three subtypes/lineages were: **influenza A – (H1N1)pdm09 (60.5%), influenza B – Victoria lineage (24.0%), and influenza A – subtyping not performed (8.7%)**.

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
