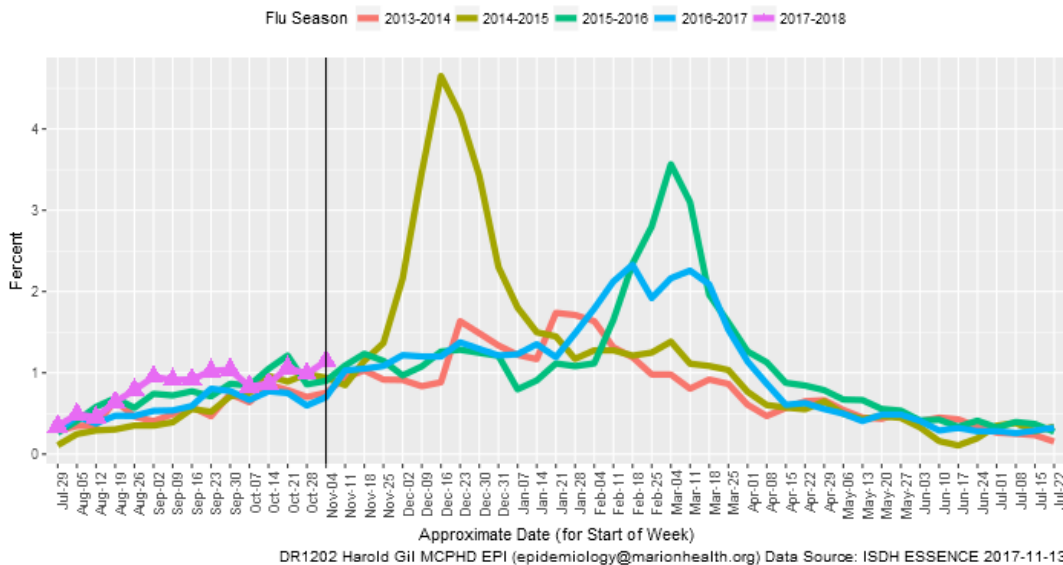
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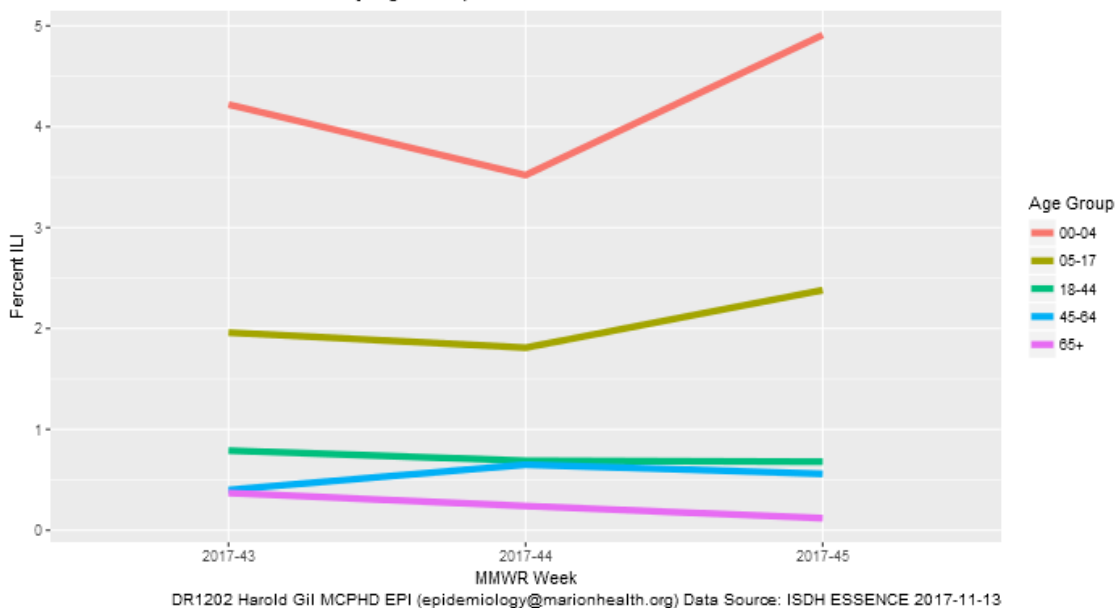
Updates on Most Recent Local Activity: Week 45 (Nov 05 – Nov 11)

- The percentage of ED visits last week (Week 45) that were related to ILI was 1.15%. This is "moderate" and normal for this time of year.
- In Marion County hospitals' ED population, ILI was most common in the 0-4 age group. Among ED visits by 0-4 year olds, 4.91% were for ILI. ILI among ED visits by 5-17 year olds was next highest, at 2.38%.

Note: ILI (Influenza-Like Illness) visit means that the patient reported fever with cough or sore throat, or used the word "flu" or "influenza" to describe either their symptoms or their reason for the ED (Emergency Department) visit.

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Local (Week 44)

- The percentage of ILI related ED visits was 0.99% ("low").
- Children of age 0-4 had the highest age-specific percent ILI (3.52%).

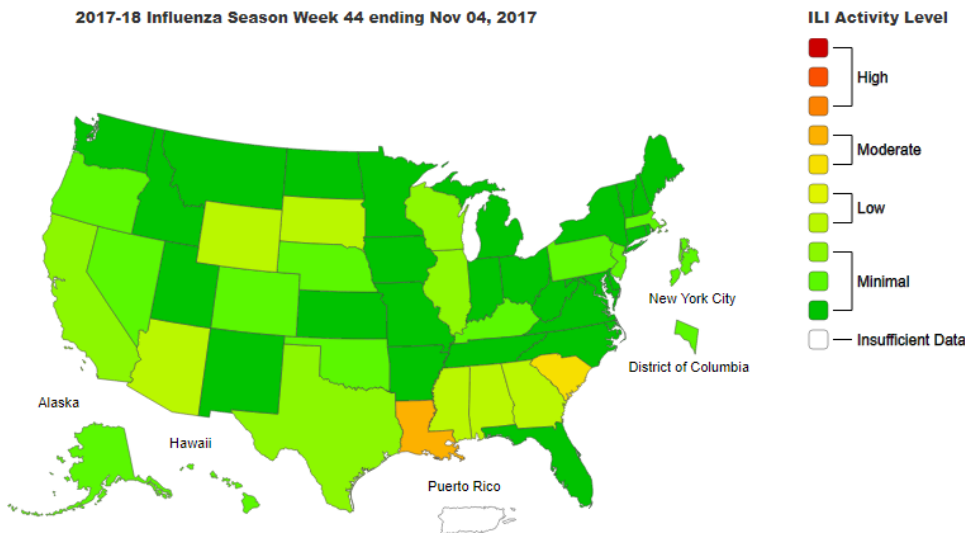
Indiana (Week 44)

- Indiana is experiencing sporadic and minimal influenza activity. For Week 44, ISDH reports 1.47% ILI at sentinel provider sites and 1.13% ILI ED visits. This is a decrease in sentinel sites and an increase in EDs.
- The total number of mortalities in Indiana this flu season is 0.
- For Week 44 and among samples tested at the state lab: 1 specimen tested positive for Influenza A/H3 seasonal virus.

- During Week 44, the majority of states were reporting minimal and sporadic influenza activity. In addition, during Week 44, 1.8% of outpatient visits reported through the U.S. Outpatient Influenza-like Illness Surveillance Network (ILINet) were due to ILI. This is higher than Week 43 (1.5%).
- One influenza-associated pediatric death has been reported to CDC this flu season.
- The most frequently identified influenza virus type reported by public health laboratories during Week 44 was Influenza A. The percentage of respiratory specimens testing positive for influenza in clinical laboratories is low. The positive specimens by type were Influenza A (72.0%) and Influenza B (28.0%).

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
